A Message from Father Charles Puthota June 06, 2021

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Feast of Corpus Christi: This Sunday is the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. For over twenty centuries the Church has been coming together to break bread and share the cup. This is my body, Jesus had said. This is my blood, Jesus had said. And he added, whenever you do this remember me. So we commemorate the sacred act of Jesus giving himself as food. The sacrament of the Eucharist is the sacrament of the sacraments. It is the source and summit of Christian life. It is in this sacrament, the church comes together again and again, drawing upon the new life Jesus gives us as we share his body and blood.

In the Eucharist, Jesus is truly, really, and substantially present. As we partake of the Eucharist, we become totally united with Christ. Jesus remains in us, we remain in Jesus. We together remain in the Father. We don't live any longer, Christ lives in us. That is why we call this sacrament "communion." Because we individually become united with Christ, we are all united with each other and in Christ. We all become the body of Christ because we share the Body of Christ. This is mystical indeed! This is a divine mystery! The vitality of Christian life is centered on the Eucharist. Our identity as Christians is tied up with the Eucharist. Faith is at the heart of our conviction that Jesus gives us his own body and blood in the Eucharist. Even like a mother giving her body and blood to her baby in her womb, Jesus gives us his body and blood in total self-gift and as a sign of his inseparable union with us.

Recently, we celebrated the First Communion of four of our Faith Formation children. If we could recover some of their excitement, faith, zeal, eagerness, devotion, desire, and their sense of awe about the Eucharist, it would indeed be a great blessing.

I'm Reaching Social Security Eligible Age: This June 11th I'll be reaching the traditionally Social-security eligible age of 65. Any birthday, especially this particular one at 65. would make us think about the before, the now, and the after. One cannot but get philosophical and theological about life. It's time, no doubt, to think about what lies ahead. At my age, it would be naive not to think about the possibilities and circumstances of retirement, when it happens, in the next few years. Also, there is a glance at the past, at all the time that has gone by, the years of search for meaning and purpose, the failures and achievements. There is also the focus on what is at present, my ministry at St. Elizabeth, with you all, as we journey together on this pilgrimage of life, sharing faith and fellowship.

As St. Paul would say which the song paraphrases well: "I thank my God each time I think of you and when I pray for you, I pray with joy." I think of my parents, siblings, and friends with deep gratitude. I thank you all for your collaboration and affirmation. Let's be friends in the Lord, as we make each other's lives as pleasant and easy as possible because of our love and forbearance for one another. While life is not forever in this world, we have love, faith, and service to offer one another now. Please in your charity do keep me in your prayers.

SACRIFICE

Today the Church focuses on the Eucharist. Today's readings remind us how connected to ancient blood sacrifices we are when offering our unbloody sacrifice. The reading from Exodus describes a solemn ritual designed so the Israelites would never forget their covenant with God.

The reading from the Letter to the Hebrews turns us from those ancient animal sacrifices, the first efforts to worship the living God. Our sacrifice is the body and blood of the Son of God. Because of Christ we have a new covenant.

The Gospel from Mark retells the establishment of that covenant, the familiar story of the Last Supper. Juxtaposed with the story of animal sacrifice as it is here, we are challenged to listen with new attention, to remember the great price paid for our salvation. Jesus gave his body and every drop of his blood for us.


