Word of God: This Sunday we read a hauntingly beautiful story of Jesus healing a blind man. Desperate, he cries out: "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on me." People try to silence him, but he shouts all the more. Such is his need. It's his only chance to get what he wants from Jesus. He prays with faith and sense of urgency and intensity and persistence. Jesus hears him and heals him. As Jesus calls him, it is said: "He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus." When we go to Jesus, we have to throw away a whole lot of things we do not need anymore. Our need, too, is like the blind man's: "Master, I want to see." Is it possible that we have eyes but do not see. We look, but do not see into the heart of people, life, and situations. We need more sight. The blind man "immediately received his sight and followed him on the way." When we can "see" better, we shall follow Jesus and be on the way. Being on the way with Jesus is all about what we are called to do as Christians. This gospel story is full of meaning for each of us, our families, and communities. It gives us insight about prayer, faith, perseverance, seeing, throwing away the baggage, following Jesus, and becoming his disciples.

Synod of Bishops 2021-2023: As you may be aware, Pope Francis inaugurated two weeks ago a two-year process of encounter and consultation called "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, and Mission." I put a note about in last week's bulletin. I shall keep sharing more in the coming weeks and months. You might also want to google this topic and do your own research about this important development in the Church all around the world. When the materials are available, I will share them with you.

Please Occupy Front Pews: A request: when you come into church for weekend Masses, please do occupy the pews in the front half of the church. That would help the latecomers to sit in the back conveniently. All this is to safeguard everyone's safety and health. When ushers lead you to the front pews, please do not resist or oppose them. They are doing their volunteer work with generosity, and they are actually following my recommendations in an effort to avoid crowding in the back pews. Please let's all collaborate and be flexible in order to promote the common good and public health. If you have any questions about this, please would you talk to me before of after Masses. As it stands now, we have about 75 people attending the Saturday 4:30 p.m. Mass and about 175 people at the Sunday 9:30 a.m. Mass. Please keep in mind our church can seat 600 people and it is highly recommended that we try to distribute the numbers as widely as possible inside the church.

Mission Statement of our Parish: Please see our parish Mission Statement on the front page of the bulletin permanently. It is the first paragraph of the Preface of the Vatican II "Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World (Gaudium et Spes). It is a towering statement about what we as people of God are called to be and do. When there is an opportunity, we could reflect on this statement in our organizations or as part of a retreat. The meaning of this statement is that we are in the world, not outside the world. Therefore what happens in the world touches the followers of Christ and calls for our participation and engagement in a continuous way. Here it is:

2022 Mass Intentions Now Available! Please follow the guidelines below when sending in your Mass requests.

Due to the large volume of Mass requests and in order to be fair to the needs of all our parishioners, the following is the Mass Book policy as set by Father Charles Puthota, Pastor:

Initially, each parishioner can request up to 10 Masses per year. Only 2 of those Masses may be on weekends depending on availability.

All Masses including the Saturday Vigil Mass and Sunday Mass will be accepting two intentions per Mass.

We do not accept individual Mass Intentions for the following days: Ash Wednesday, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, All Souls, All Saints, Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas. The intentions will be for the entire St. Elizabeth Community.

Due to the volume of requests, **Masses cannot be reserved by phone or in person.** Requests must be submitted in writing or by email: stelizabethchurchsf@gmail.com

Not all dates are available for Mass Intentions, so we ask that you be prepared with alternate dates and times. If your requested date is not available an alternate date will be chosen for you.

Once you receive your confirmation letter with your schedule of Masses, please make your check payable to St. Elizabeth Church. Please do not send payment with your request. Please allow time for processing. The monetary gift that has been suggested by our Archdiocese is \$10.00 per mass.
