A Message from Father Charles Puthota November 7, 2021



Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Month of November to Honor the Faithful Departed: In the midst of our hectic activities, let's keep those who have died from our families and circles of friends in our hearts and minds and prayers. Our love for them continues and survives death. Our faith informs us of the new life they are given, thanks to the resurrection of our Lord who vanguished sin and death. Our hope impels us to long for union with our dear departed when the time comes, in the Kingdom of God. If our dear ones are buried in a cemetery close by, it would be wonderful to visit their graves and pray. It's been a Catholic way of doing things for a couple of thousand years. As we pray for the dear departed, let's learn to look at death in a realistic, faith-filled, liberating way, so that the inevitability of death can deepen our desire for life and love. Death can enhance our love for life. "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen."

Pope Francis's Efforts on Climate Change: On October 04, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis called for a meeting of dozens of religious leaders with a plea to protect the environment, warning that "future generations will never forgive us if we miss the opportunity to protect our common home." On October 09, Pope Francis called on governments to work together to tackle climate change as he hosted lawmakers from around the world who were in Rome for a two-day preparatory meeting for the annual United Nations Climate Change Conference. Pope Francis addressed the lawmakers in the Paul VI Hall, days after signing a joint appeal with religious leaders and scientists that called on governments to come together on goals at the upcoming conference. Challenging the lawmakers to overcome "the narrow confines" of partisan politics to quickly reach consensus on fighting climate change, Pope Francis called on lawmakers to "transition towards clean energy; to adopt sustainable land use practices, preventing deforestation and restoring forests, conserving biodiversity, favoring food systems that are environmentally friendly and respectful of local cultures, and to promote sustainable lifestyles and patterns of consumption and production."

COP26 Climate Change Summit in Glasgow: As followers of Christ, we are actively engaged in protecting and preserving the planet earth, our common home, as Pope Francis calls it. The earth has been given to us by the Creator and we are to practice wise stewardship of this precious gift. The Holy Father's vision about our caring for the earth was spelled out in 2015 in his second encyclical "Laudato Si." As you may be aware, the UN Climate Change Conference is meeting now in Glasgow, Scotland, from October 31 through November 12.

The COP26 summit will bring nations together to accelerate action towards the goals of the Paris Agreement and the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change. Climate change is the greatest risk facing the human race. Around the world, storms, floods and wildfires are intensifying. Air pollution affects vast numbers of people. Environmental degradation and global warming are happening at alarming speeds. Unpredictable weather causes untold damage to properties and livelihoods. The goal of this Glasgow conference is to secure global net zero plan by countries adopting practical measures such as phasing out coal, curtailing deforestation, switching to electric vehicles and investing in renewables. It will involve protecting and restoring ecosystems and building defenses against loss of homes, livelihoods, and even lives. The Holy Father is urging the nations to take "radical" action to address climate change.

Highly Recommending a Book: The title of this book is "Compendium: Catechism of the Catholic Church." Published by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Cost is: \$16.95. This book is an excellent synthesis of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, in concise, question-and-answer form. As you may know, the Catechism consists of four parts. 1. Profession of faith (interpretation of the Creed). 2. Celebration of the Christian Mystery (Sacraments). 3. Life in Christ (Christian morality). 4. Christian prayer. THE POOR

As Christians, we hear a lot about the witness and service that we are called to render to the poor among us. However, the poor also have a witness and a service to render to us. Like the actions of the widow in today's Gospel, the openness and generosity of many of those who are poor, even in the midst of their own poverty, bear witness to the fact that, ultimately, we can depend only on God. Giving one's all witnesses that God will give all to anyone who trusts in divine goodness.

The poor or disadvantaged also serve. They serve judgment on our individual and corporate ways of acting. If people are sleeping in our streets, that is a judgment on our priorities regarding others. At the same time, the poor can act as mediators of salvation. When they care for others they can redeem our indifference and insensibility, lead us to care as well, and save us from ourselves.

> 2022 Mass Intentions Now Available! Please follow the guidelines below when sending in your Mass requests.

Due to the large volume of Mass requests and in order to be fair to the needs of all our parishioners, the following is the Mass Book policy as set by Father Charles Puthota, Pastor:

Initially, each parishioner can request up to 10 Masses per year. Only 2 of those Masses may be on weekends depending on availabilty.

All Masses including the Saturday Vigil Mass and Sunday Mass will be accepting two intentions per Mass.

We do not accept individual Mass Intentions for the following days:

Ash Wednesday, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, All Souls, All Saints, Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas. The intentions will be for the entire St. Elizabeth Community.

Due to the volume of requests, Masses cannot be reserved by phone or in person. Requests must be submitted in writing or by email: stelizabethchurchsf@amail.com

Not all dates are available for Mass Intentions, so we ask that you be prepared with alternate dates and times. If your requested date is not available an alternate date will be chosen for you.

Once you receive your confirmation letter with your schedule of Masses, please make your check payable to St. Elizabeth Church. Please do not send payment with your request. Please allow time for processing. The monetary gift that has been suggested by our Archdiocese is \$10.00 per mass.
