Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Mass and Reception with Archbishop José Cabantan from the Philippines: On August 15, the Feast of the Assumption of the BVM, we were delighted to have with us Most Reverend José Cabantan, Archbishop of Cagayan de Oro, Mindanao, Philippines, who celebrated the Mass. It was also to mark the conclusion of the celebrations of the 500 Years of Christianity in the Philippines, which we had started at our parish in May 2021. Archbishop Cabantan spoke eloquently about the role of "Mama Mary" in the history of salvation and the faith journey of the Philippines. Word of God, 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time: All nations and cultures and peoples are called to the Kingdom of God. It's up to individuals to respond to God's grace. Jews and gentiles alike are invited to share in God's plan for the human family to find their happiness and fulfillment. God has given the free will to everyone. In Isaiah, there is a promise that "they shall bring all your brothers and sisters from all the nations as an offering to the Lord...to Jerusalem, my holy mountain..." The responsorial psalm affirms the call to "go out to all the world and tell the good news." In the Gospel from Luke, Jesus affirms that "people

will come from the east and the west and from the north and the south and will recline at table in the kingdom of God." However, we have to "strive to enter through the narrow gate..." There is always resistance from various forces in life to the call to be the disciples of Jesus. Everything and anything goes cannot be the way to fullness of life. We need to pick and choose those things that are truly helpful for the life with Jesus and avoid those things that are contrary to the values of Jesus. For example, following the beatitudes in the Sermon on the Mount is not easy, and yet we are called to embrace those "attitudes-to-be." In that sense, we need to enter through the narrow gate. The messianic call to the universal salvation that Jesus offers to all nations is urgent, and we as Christians are to make that a reality for all peoples through our witnessing to Jesus in the way that we live, love, and serve.

GOD'S PEOPLE GATHER

Our readings today remind us of the larger story of the Bible, of God's purposes and promises for the world. Because of humanity's rejection of God, as told in Genesis, human communities were first dispersed. Isaiah proclaims that one day God will gather these communities to be healed and reconciled with God. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus echoes Isaiah and teaches that all peoples in God's promised future "will recline at table in the kingdom of God." Notice that in Isaiah, the nations coming to God do not lose their ethnicity or unique identity. They bring their own distinct cultural gifts to God's table. Each people has its unique history with God. has received distinct blessings from God, and each is accountable to God. Today, we live in a global and multi-cultural Church. FAITH FORMATION REGISTRATION OPEN

New and continuing registration is being accepted for the 2022-23 Faith Formation program. Registration forms may be requested by calling the Faith Formation Coordinator at 415-672-4903 or email sophielady7@aol.com. Forms can also be picked up at the Rectory office or after mass at the back of Church.

Even if your child will be a returning student, a 2022-23 Registration Form is required. Registration Fees are \$45.00 per child per year. Classes begin on September 10th on select Saturday mornings from 9-11:00 am.

Preparation for First Holy Communion and Confirmation are each two-year programs, beginning no earlier than 1st grade for Communion and no earlier than 7th grade for Confirmation. There is no upper age limit for Communion.
