Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

The Church is called to do these tasks: proclaiming the Kingdom and bearing witness to Christ; working toward a human family of love, justice, peace, dignity, and respect; to help create a world where God's blessings are shared and cherished by everyone; and for the Church to be a Mother welcoming anyone and everyone into her arms of goodness, kindness, compassion, and forgiveness. Lent: Fourth Sunday of Lent: Laetare Sunday: This Sunday in Lent is called Laetare Sunday, which means Rejoice Sunday. As we go through the penitential and ascetical practices of Lent, journeying toward the sufferings and death of Jesus in the Holy Week, we are given a hint, a hope, of the joyful anticipation of the victory of Jesus at Easter. The name comes from the first words of the Entrance Antiphon for Mass, "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, O Jerusalem"). This Sunday we stand at about the half-way point of the Lenten season. The altar may be decorated with flowers this Sunday. The liturgical color of the vestments is rose.

Ten Practical Things You Can Do in Lent: As you know well, Lent is a time set aside for slowing down and thinking about how we live and love, how our faith journey is, how our family life is, how we relate to larger community, what we do to help those in need, etc. Shall I make 10 practical suggestions for this holy season? 1. Make sure to attend the weekend Mass. 2. If possible, catch a daily Mass either before you go to work or at lunch break near where you work. 3. Read reflectively a chapter each day from one or two of the gospels. 4. Go to confession before Easter. 5. Become more kind toward and

respectful of others, starting with your family. 6. Do one thing at least which will connect you with someone sad, poor or in need. 7. Read online some of the sayings and actions of Pope Francis as a way of being inspired. 8. Do one thing by way of faith or service to connect you deeply with the Catholic Church. 9. Do one thing by way of service to connect you with the town/city/world. 10. Appreciate people more readily, generously, and gratefully.

Word of God: Blindness and Sight: You may be aware that the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) program. It's for the adults seeking to become Catholics. They go through a long process of preparation: Inquiry, the Catechumenate, Purification and Enlightenment. and Mystagogy. The Readings at the Mass we read this year, Year A, are related specifically to the catechumens journeying toward baptism at Easter. Not only for RCIA catechumens, but the process of faith and growth is for everyone. Last Sunday, the theme was the living water, as RCIA candidates as well as all of us thirst for the life in Christ, and that living water is the Spirit of Christ poured into our hearts. This fourth Sunday it is about the new vision that we are all called to acquire. Seeing is believing. To be able to see, as the man born blind does, is to be on the way to new life with Christ. What are our various versions of blindness that Jesus is waiting to heal? What are the things that block our vision for God and the world? How can we see as Jesus sees everything? Let's See, Judge, Act!



SEEING THE LIGHT

Our Lenten journey continues this Sunday as we hear of Jesus healing a blind man in the Gospel of John. Jesus proclaims himself the light of the world, a light that overcomes darkness and enables a new capacity to see. The man, blind from birth, was able to begin his path to sight by first acknowledging his blindness. We are reminded of God's ongoing invitation to us to journey from blindness to sight. We begin by acknowledging our own capacity for "blind spots," and so open ourselves to uncomfortable truths and to God's healing. We are invited to see beyond appearances, as the reading from Samuel indicates, and to look into the heart of things. We are invited to "live as children of light" as the letter to the Ephesians teaches. Like the man healed from blindness, we may gradually learn to see fully and to follow Jesus.

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TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — As the prophet Samuel anointed David with oil, the spirit of the LORD rushed upon David

(1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a).

Psalm — My shepherd is the Lord; I shall not want (Psalm 23).

Second Reading — You who were once darkness are now light in the Lord. Live as children of light (Ephesians 5:8-14).

Gospel — The man who was blind from birth proclaimed: The one called Jesus made clay with his saliva, anointed my eyes with it, and told me to wash. When I washed, I was able to see! (John 9:1-41 [1, 6-9, 13-17, 34-38])
